History of Cummins Community Opportunity Shop

Thirty years ago a group of likeminded people in Cummins met to discuss the benefits of having a Community Op Shop for the district, and subsequently a constitution was drawn up. With a loan of \$800 from Cummins & District Lions Club, a premises was rented on Railway Terrace.

The opening day was 1st September 1992 and was a great start.

After 8 years of renting the building was sold, so a shift became necessary. The committee decided a permanent place was needed. A building further along Railway Terrace was bought for \$30,000 with a loan of \$20,000 from the DCLEP and \$10,000 from the private sector. On 15th December 2000 the new premises was opened.

However, after 8 years in the shop the DCLEP approached the committee with an offer to buy back the building as it was needed for their office expansion.

The DCLEP purchase the Craft Shop on Bruce
Terrace for the Op Shop. This was now the best
location in the main street attracting more foot traffic
and travellers.

In 2017, thanks to grants from Cummins Community Bank with \$12,000 and the DCLEP grant of \$10,000 a 11mx14m shed was constructed with the shop proceeds paying for the balance of costs.

The building has been well maintained and upgraded when necessary. Rags are sold to farmers and business, and the surplus garments are sent in white bags to State Wide Recycling Centre. By doing this the shop is eliminating the amount of donated goods going to land fill. A big thankyou to the Cummins Mill for wrapping and palletting the white bags before they are freighted to Adelaide.

The shop also donates goods to various groups:
Dignity Bags (as new products) to Yarridy House
(formerly Women's Shelter); Craft items to
Kindy/ the School/ Rural care/ Mosaics/ Christmas
Wonderland.

A highlight for the Op Shop was in January 2004 being awarded the "Australia Day Organization of the Year" for LEP. The committee and volunteers are very proud of the money raised in the 30 years of operation. Donations amounting to \$302,000 has been returned back to the District.

KNOWING THE FIRE DANGER RATING MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE


Fire Danger Ratings are now simpler and easier to understand. By using the latest science and technology, they provide a more clear and accurate rating to save properties and lives.

The Fire Danger Ratings give you an indication of the consequences of a fire, if a fire was to start.

The higher the rating is, the more dangerous the conditions will be.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

The Fire Danger Ratings have four levels, which are:



MODERATE

Plan and prepare.

Most fires can be controlled

 Stay up to date and be ready to act if there is a fire.

HIGH

Be ready to act.

Fires can be dangerous.

- There's a heightened risk. Be alert for fires in your area.
- Decide what you will do if a fire starts.
- If a fire starts, your life and property may be at risk.
- The safest option is to avoid bushfire risk areas.

EXTREME

Take action now to protect your life and property.

Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous

- These are dangerous fire conditions.
- Check your bushfire plan and that your property is fire ready.
- If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, go to a safer location well before the fire impacts.
- Reconsider travel through bushfire risk areas.

CATASTROPHIC

For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas.

If a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost.

- These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire.
- Your life may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire.
- Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.
- Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions. You may not be able to leave and help may not be available.





Rural doctor recognised for "enormous service" to SA community over 30 years

A Rural Generalist doctor who has served the small community of Cummins, on South Australia's Eyre Peninsula, for over 30 years has received the ACRRM-RDAA Peter Graham 'Cohuna' Award for 2022.


Dr Gerard Quigley was presented with the award at the Rural Medicine Australia (RMA22) conference dinner in Canberra on Friday night.

Presented annually by the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM) and Rural Doctors Association of Australia (RDAA), the Award recognises rural doctors who provide outstanding advocacy and medical service to their community.

It has been awarded since 2008 in memory of the late Dr Peter Graham, who served the Cohuna community in rural Victoria for 48 years.



"Gerard is highly deserving of this prestigious Award, given the enormous dedication and commitment he has shown in caring for the people of Cummins and surrounding towns for more than three decades.



"He has worked hard to ensure that the hospital can continue to provide 24 hour emergency care, including general medicine, day surgery, outpatients and palliative care. As such, he is regularly on-call to attend the hospital, both during the day and overnight.

"Gerard also provides anaesthetic services at the hospital, and for many years provided 24/7 on-call obstetric services until the hospital's maternity unit was closed some years ago.

"While Gerard has worked mainly as a solo doctor during his time in Cummins, he has been a long-term supervisor of GP Registrars, and has provided these doctors with a very supportive teaching and training environment as they undertake their advanced GP training.

"Gerard also has a long tradition of training medical students in Cummins, at both his general practice and the hospital. Due to the high-quality learning he had been providing to sixth year medical students, the Adelaide Rural Clinical School approached him a few years ago to widen this to include fifth year medical students.

"He commenced training the fifth year student cohort in 2021, with the students describing their time in Cummins as an enjoyable, rewarding and great learning experience.









"It cannot be underestimated how many future doctors Gerard has encouraged to seriously consider a rural medical career through the quality learning experience he has provided – this is a legacy that deserves significant recognition in itself."

RDAA President, Dr Megan Belot, said: "Gerard is the quintessential rural doctor – someone who has devoted much of his professional and personal life to caring for a community that he truly loves.

"Without the significant service he has provided during the past 30 years, Cummins may very well have been without a doctor at all, and almost certainly without many of the services that are still provided at the local hospital.

"It is not only through his provision of quality medical care that Gerard has supported his community, though – he has also been actively involved in other aspects of the community's life.

"Just one of many examples is during the COVID lockdown, when Cummins residents – like many other Australians – had to stay at home. In response, Gerard and his daughter Sophie created an online District Talent Show to help the community stay connected during this difficult time.

"Gerard is also giving back to his community and profession by training the next generation of doctors and, in doing so, showing them why rural practice can make for a great medical career. As someone who was raised in Adelaide, and got to experience Rural Medicine himself through clinical placements he undertook as a medical student – he knows how important this type of exposure is.

"Gerard is highly deserving of the Peter Graham 'Cohuna' Award, and we warmly congratulate him on receiving it."

Dr Quigley said: "I was very surprised to get the phone call from (then) ACRRM President, Dr Sarah Chalmers, informing me I was to receive this Award. I am aware of previous recipients of the Award and the many Rural Generalists who contribute to their communities, and I feel honoured to have been nominated.

"My own journey through rural practice has seen my interests change and the focus of my practice vary over time, but I have developed a strong relationship with the community I work in.

"I am very lucky to work in a community that needs, respects and cares about me. Working on the Lower Eyre Peninsula has given me the opportunity to build a robust healthcare team and contribute to education and training at both the undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

"I can't imagine working in another role that would give me the same rewards while allowing the opportunities to raise a family in a great rural community. Having the support of this community, and my wife Jo-Anne and my family, is what anchors me here.

"After all this time I still feel being a Rural Generalist is the best career in Medicine."

Cummins Men's Shed

The shed is progressing at a steady pace with all activities. Our card players on Thursdays range between 4 to 6 people and is enjoyed by all. We had another successful year making Christmas trees from pallets, with a new design and free standing base. It's amazing the amount we have sold over the last 3 years. Cummins and District Health Focus Group

In 2022, the Health Focus Group has met 3 times, in May, July and August. Our group consists of representatives from the Cummins Hospital Aux, Cummins Community Bank, Cummins Op Shop, Lower Eyre Council, Lower Eyre Health Advisory Council (LEHAC), Medical Practice, Men's Shed and other interested individuals.

We have met with the Streaky Bay community-owned Medical Board to investigate the model they are using to maintain their medical clinic, and we are actively supporting the Medical Clinic in Cummins to secure another doctor.

We have also written to Regional Development Australia Eyre Peninsula (RDA EP), requesting a Health forum for all of EP and have had a good response.

LEHAC are actively securing community funds to be used for future doctor housing, and have held a succesful Navigating Aged Care Expo in October.

We are working toward succession for our medical services, in order to limit the issue being experienced elsewhere in rural communities trying to keep their GP and nursing staff.

Barwell Boys Plaque Unveiled

On Friday, 30th September in the Cummins Railway Triangle Park a plaque was unveiled, commemorating 100 years since the Barwell Boy Scheme commenced.

The scheme, for British boys aged from 15 to 17 years, was launched in Britain by Henry Barwell, then SA premier, in an effort to replace the devastating loss of youth in the first world war, leaving the rural districts desperately short of labour.

More than 100 people attended, with some travelling from as far as Queensland and Victoria and including children from the local Area School. Many descendants of the Barwell Boys were present.

Peter Treloar welcomed everyone to the event. During his speech he referred to the Boys' contribution to developing rural South Australia and the hardships they faced.

A day in the life of a Barwell Boy

"I get up before sunrise and get the horse out of the paddock and feed him. Then I put the horse in the sledge and carry two tubs of water up to the end of the block ... I fill the boiler, light the fire underneath and get it boiling by 7. After that, I chop enough wood to last for the day. I then go to breakfast. At half past seven I help to load the dip and then go on picking 100 buckets a day, which is about a ton

of fresh fruit. At 5.10 after [the other pickers] have gone, I have to cut lucerne for three horses, stack the peaches, box 2 or 3 cwt [150kg] of currants, get in wood for morning and do diverse odd jobs. By this time it is dark and when I've had tea and a bath it is bedtime."

"(Barwell Boy apprenticed at Waikerie)"

Graham Dean, son of a Barwell Boy, presented his summary of the immigration scheme, which ran from 1922 to 1924.


Beth Carter, the main organiser of the event, and Graham Dean then unveiled the plaque, which was set into a granite block.

At the completion of the ceremony, most of the guests attended the lunch at the nearby Cummins Hotel, during which there was a constant exchange of family stories that people were reluctant to leave but the event eventually concluded at 4.30pm.
