The Marble Ranges


I have known the Marble Ranges




Cummins Hospital Auxiliary Report

The GR's: Refuse Reduce Reuse Refill, Recycle, Rot (Compost)

Recycling is necessary to stop valuable resource material from going to land fill, but it is not the magic fix all. Many items can still not go into the recycling, that's why it is important to go through the 6R's first. Organic material is a resource that is wasted if it goes in the rubbish bin.

This month: recycling organic matter a.k.a composting

Composting home organic waste is a win-win for the environment. It's the cheapest, most effective and environmentally friendly way to improve your garden's health and it keeps organic waste out of landfill.


Audits of garbage bin "waste" In Australia have found that approximately 50% of the rubbish put in the everyday mixed-waste bin is from kitchen food waste (33%) and garden vegetation (~10%). Audits carried out on garbage bins in Port Lincoln last year by KESAB (Keep South Australia Beautiful) fitted with the national average finding the contents were made up of 35% compostable food waste and 24% garden organics.

We may think that its ok to send organic waste to landfill as it just erodes away naturally and works it's way back into the earth But while organic materials do deteriorate much quicker than processed materials like plastics, when it is buried in landfill under all the piles of rubbish it undergoes anaerobic decomposition (because of the lack of oxygen) producing methane. When released into the atmosphere methane is a potent greenhouse gas which contributes to global warming. Organic waste in landfill also leak can also combine with other toxic waste and leak out into groundwater and pollute land.

By turning food scraps and organic garden waste into compost you can:

- produce a cheap, effective and environmentally friendly way to improve your garden's health by returning nutrients to the soil.
- eliminate the need for chemical fertilisers
- improve soil structure by building organic matter in the soil, this helps drainage of waterlogged soils and help soils retain moisture in dry soils
- improving the soil will also bring life to your soil in the form of microbes and microorganisms.
- keep it out of land fill

For many living rurally disposing of kitchen food waste and garden organics is not a problem with chickens to feed and space to compost. But not all have the space or a garden. These days there are a variety of ways to compost from closed bins, open piles, in-ground trench composting (aka dig a hole and bury it), tumbler bins, Bokashi bins, a wide variety of worm farms, even dedicated pet faeces composters and groups such as ShareWaste groups which match up composters with food scrap donors and community gardens that have shared compost bins and food waste collections (one that is popular is collecting coffee grounds from cafes), so it is possible to find a way to compost which suits your situation.





- 1. These days it is possible to put a wide range of paper and carboard products in the compost and worm farm as printing inks are vegetable oil based and nontoxic. Just don't' use glossy magazines and boxes
- 2. Keep mice out of black plastic compost bins by covering the bottom with wire mesh like aviary mesh.
- 3. Always add more dry material such as shredded paper, cardboard, brown leaves or straw than kitchen scraps to avoid the compost becoming a stinking wet mess.

GM Crops survey

Council staff have moved the shelter from the Cummins Cemetery to the Coulta Cemetery. Friends of Cummins Cemetery have raised funds to install four new shelters at the Cummins Cemetery.

Strategic Plan

The Strategic Plan is considered to be one of the key Council documents – it informs every annual budget, sets Council's priorities and work programs and forms the basis of all financial plans so feedback from the community is vitally important.

Following a community survey and meetings held in 2019 to gauge community priorities, a Draft Strategic Plan has been developed and is now released for further consultation.

Copies of the draft Strategic Plan can be accessed on Council's website (www.lowereyrepeninsula.sa. gov.au) or alternatively, a hard copy can be provided from both Council Offices – 32 Railway Terrace, Cummins and 38 Washington Street, Port Lincoln, at no cost.

Draft Budget 2020/21 update

The draft 2020/21 budget has been released for public consultation, with written submissions to close on July 3. Members of the public will have the opportunity to ask

questions and make a verbal submission to Council from 9am to 10am at a special meeting on July 6 before the budget is formalised for adoption at Council's ordinary meeting on July 17.

Hardship Policy / COVID-19 Assistance

Council have adopted a new Financial hardship policy to assist ratepayers who are experiencing financial difficulty, with the policy including reference to emergency events - refer council website.

In relation to the current health Council pandemic have resolved to waive fines and interest on payments for March through to August (inclusive) for those customers that demonstrate a reduction of 30 per cent or more in business who income. or experiencing a reduction in working hours due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Council has included a range of other options in its draft budget and Annual Business Plan to support businesses whose revenue has been impacted by the Covid-19 health pandemic, and to support community groups and sporting clubs including:

- Non-essential businesses impacted by a directive issued by Commissioner of Police
- Accommodation providers where premises are used solely for business purposes and the provision of accommodation is the primary activity conducted from the land
- Coffin Bay, North Shields and Cummins Caravan Parks
- \$300 cash contribution to community and sporting clubs that were required to close due to COVID-19 to meet their fixed costs.

While playgrounds, skate parks and campgrounds have been reopened, the following Council assets / services currently remain closed or suspended:

- The Cummins Institute (including the public toilets). While Community Halls have been permitted to reopen by the State Government, the Cummins Institute is being utilised by a third party for the provision of health services at this time, therefore reopening cannot yet be facilitated.

Draft Annual Business Plan

2020/21 SUMMARY

2020-21 Highlights

Roads

The budget includes \$193,800 to seal small discrete road sections in Cummins & \$193,800 to kerb, widen and seal a section of Bruce Tce, Cummins.

Rehabilitation works on Bratten Way are budgeted to continue (\$1,738,500) subject to receiving Special Local Roads Grant funding on a 2:1 basis.

\$70,700 has been included to commence survey and design works for the future construction and sealing of Ford Avenue and Boundary Road.

Resheeting priorities are assessed annually with \$771,200 of resheeting works programed.

\$283,700 and \$811,500 has been included in the budget for sealed and unsealed road maintenance.

Waste

Waste management continues to be a high cost expense accounting for 16.54% of rate revenue (or \$1,120,200) for kerbside collection and disposal and the operation of waste transfer stations in Coffin Bay and Cummins.

RUBBLE PITS WANTED

Council are continually looking for new rubble sources to undertake its annual rubble road resheeting projects across the district.

Without new rubble sources the cost to Council to resheet roads will increase significantly impacting the extent of rubble resheeting works that can be achieved each year within its current budgets.

If you have potential rubble sources available, please contact Council staff on 08 8676 0400 to discuss Council's potential use and acquisition of this rubble.

Business Activities

Port Lincoln Airport

- Provides Council with a return on investment of 6% per annum (budgeted to be \$56,500).
- The return equates to a 1% saving on rates to every rate payer.
- Estimate of 80,000 passenger movement in the year – down from 170,000 in previous year.
- Engagement of a consultant to complete an Aviation Strategy for future development of the PLA precinct and its operations
- Operating loss of \$853,900 due to COVID-19 impact on passenger numbers and other business operations.

Coffin Bay Caravan Park Lease

- Provides Council with a return on investment of 6% per annum (budgeted to be \$3,800).
- Repays \$68,400 in debt.
- Operating loss of \$34,700 due to COVID-19 impact on lease fees.

Cummins Homes

- \$12,600 Cash surplus
- \$21,300 to replace failing septic tank.
- Accumulated Cash deficit of \$101,700 at 30/06/21.
- Occupancy rates anticipated at 85% average capacity.

CWMS Schemes

- Operating loss of \$39,400 due primarily to \$107,500 of septic tank desludging
- Occupied levy of \$500 per assessment aimed at ensuring long term sustainability of the schemes.

Community Development Projects

\$60,000 to develop a masterplan for the Coffin Bay Township

\$50,000 in grant funding made available to community and sports groups for eligible projects.


When determining the rates to set, Council considered the following:

- Consumer Price Index (Adelaide) 2.40%
- Rate Reduction Initiatives
 - -0.43% Reduction in maintenance expenditures
 - -0.57% Reduction in new projects expenditure
 - -0.64% Funding projects from accumulated cash
- Strategic Objectives
 - 0.29% to engage a building rules consultant
- Legislative Requirements
 - 0.48% to fund the increase in the State Governments Solid Waste Levy imposed on Council
 - 0.16% to fund a new Regional Assessment Panel
- Sustainability
 - 0.20% to fund increased annual depreciation expense associated with assets constructed in the 2019/20 financial year.

Total of 1.89% on average to existing properties


Councils approach is that upgraded roads are funded through loan borrowings and subsequently paid for by users of the roads over a 10 year period.

The maintenance and upgrading of roads continues to be the main focus for Council with road re-sheeting, grading, resealing and other sealed roads maintenance equating to 32.90% of general rate revenue. A further 6.68% of rate revenue is used to pay for loan repayments on recent road sealing projects bringing total road expenditure to \$2.68m or 39.58% of rate revenue.



Debt

Council debt (excluding self funded / business activities) at 30 June 2021 is expected to be \$4.71 million with repayments being \$830,000 and accounting for 12.25% of general rate revenue.



State Government NRM Levy

Council is required to levy all rateable properties based on a properties assigned land use category on behalf of the Natural Resources Management Board (NRM Board).

The total levy required to be raised by Council and remitted to the NRM Board is \$359,400 in the 2020/21 financial year.

It is anticipated that the following land use categories will be levied as follows:

Residential	\$ 79.15
Commercial	\$ 118.72
Industrial	\$ 118.72
Primary Producer	\$ 158.30
Other & Vacant	\$ 79.15
